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A New Way to Look at My Pain

One of my favorite preachers of the 19th century is a man named Joseph Parker. His reminder to ministers is very stirring. "Speak to the suffering, and you will never lack an audience. There are suffering people in every church. There is a broken heart in every crowd. There is pain in the pew and in the pulpit. That's why comfort in discomforting times is a high commodity. We all want it and we all need it. What your comfort looks like may surprise you. It's not coming from a professional counselor equipped with a PHD on human behavior. Your comfort is the person who has been to hell and back, still smells like smoke with a smile on their face. One minister said it this way, 'If you are looking for somebody who can give you wisdom, may I recommend to you that you look for someone who has been hurt deeply, whose faith has remained unshaken."

The apostle Paul gives us a new way to look at the painful seasons in our lives. He tells you that there is purpose in your pain. And when not viewed correctly, you risk wasting your pain. Paul answers one of the many "why" questions that gets asked in painful moments. Though the answer is not all encompassing, it will give clarity to the question, "Why did I have to go through that hard time?" and "Why would God make me suffer that way?" Buckle up, it's a new way to look at pain.

"All praise to the God and Father of our Master, Jesus the Messiah! Father of all mercy! God of all healing counsel! He comes alongside us when we go through hard times, and before you know it, he brings us alongside someone else who is going through hard times so that we can be there for that person just as God was there for us" (2 Corinthians 1:3-4. MSG).

Pain redeemed is better than pain removed.

Paul's second letter to the Corinthian church has always held a special place in my heart. Paul seems to show amazing vulnerability, almost to the point of raw honesty. I don't think Paul is writing some theological thesis, I think Paul is writing from experience. Paul realizes what is on the other side of his pain. Paul is realizing who is on the other side of his pain. 18th Century pastor JH Jowett said, "God does not comfort us to make us comfortable; but to make us comforters." Paul is snapping us out of a selfish way to look at difficulty. If you look beyond your pain, you see ministry.

As we were approaching Christmas, I got a call that I knew was coming. My 101-year-old mother passed away. I expected it but it still stung. My father died in 2000 and my mom 23 years later. Having now lost both of my parents, I felt like an orphan. Both my parents are gone. There has been a few difficult moments in my life when my father would say to me, "Why don't you just come home." I am now unable to hear him speak or have a home to go to. I have become an oprhan. I am now parentless.

As I was fixated on that thought, something started to happen over the next five weeks. Friends from around the country started having their fathers and mothers pass away. Some five stories were brought to my attention. And it was Paul's admonition and instruction that snapped me out of my orphan mindset and set me on a path to bring comfort to others that are feeling the pain of their loss. I needed to look beyond my loss and realize I suffered first to help those who are suffering now.

The apostle Paul said, "He comes alongside us when we go through hard times, and before you know it, he brings us alongside someone else who is going through hard times so that we can be there for that person just as God was there for us." I am comforted to be a comforter. My pain is not meant for me to cop an attitude

and say, "You don't know what I'm going through." My pain is for me to say, "I know what you are going through let me help you." That is biblical. You have been comforted to be a comforter. You have gone through it to help someone else get through it. When you don't use your pain to comfort, you will never turn pain to wisdom.

It's a new way to look at your pain. It snaps us out of extended sorrow and grief. There are people that are still feeling the pain and the sting of a bad past because you have kept silent about your pain. One of the things that God has ordained is for you are to talk about your affliction and how you found comfort. When you hear someone's tough story. Something in you will speak, "I know that story. I experienced that story." It's at that very moment that you are to bring comfort to that person.

Paul's words answers the question "Why did I have to go through that?" Has it ever crossed your mind why are things so hard? Now you know. God is not punishing me, God is equipping me to help get others through it. I don't know who said it but I concur with these words, "Pain redeemed is better than pain removed." You redeem the pain when you comfort people.

Zambia Water Project

212 Ministry Testimony






